With the school finally open we were able to start another educational project, this time for the teachers. The aim is to offer an exchange program for teaching staff so they can extend their teaching experi-

taken on the responsability of keeping up the strong bond that has developed with the African teachers, whilst Bridget has decided to return to Africa as a full time volunteer. Her work will initiate in Uganda and

then continue to Kenya where she will work at the Imani children's home. «I sponsor a child in Uganda and I've been dreaming to meet him for a long time», she explains. «I'm so excited to lend a helping hand». Just a drop in the ocean, she minimizes. But a drop can make the difference in a number of children's lives.

My trip to Italy was the best opportunity I have yet to experience as a teacher. The welcome was very special from everyone at BAPS and BES. I learned so much during my three week stay, but just to mention a few, the system of education is one to admire and one I would wish for my children back in Kenya. The educational research clearly stood out for me. I learned that by adopting a child centered approach, by observing and understanding the children more, it was so much easier to get them involved in their learning. A learning that is more interesting to them as opposed to me choosing what I think would interest them. I also got tips from the Reception and Year 1 classes on how to inspire the children and engage them in creative writing. Having the children research different projects in the same class was also an eye opener for me.

As we speak I have already started to implement some of the good practice I observed during my experience at BAPS/BES hoping it will yield good results.

I take this occasion to extend a warm welcome to all the families and teaching staff of BAPS/BES to come and visit us here in Kenya at the Learning Hub.

PROJECT THAT ALL HELP TO MAKE A DIFFERENCE

The ingenious and tireless work of the Student Council during all of the scholastic year organizing a multitude of events (see the table here below) certainly bought its fruits. An amazing Euro 2.989,52 was raised.

The BES and BAPS community gathered all their Esselunga vouchers which enabled us to provide the Learning Hub with a video-camera three notebooks 15" Intel 13, three tablets with attachable keyboards and a maxi-pack of coloured paper. Numerous have been the mini-projects proposed and implemented by lots of children from all the year levels (Y1 to Y5) that together raised Euro 62,50. The British School of Milan also joined forces with nearly Euro 600 to support two African students at St. Dominics. The BAPS/BES traditional Summer Fête produced an astounding Euro 6.882,92, part of which will be destined to the Learning Hub in Kenya. A sincere thank you to two special friends, Laura Avanzi and Klaus Schuler who celebrated their birthdays by donating to the orphan children of Imani instead of receiving gifts.

KIO KIT: A REVOLUTION FOR EDUCATION

African technology for Africa. Preparations are being made to introduce the Kio Kit (Kio means mirror in Swahili) at the Learning Hub. The project consists of a modem, 40 tablets and a wi-fi router that provides an Internet connection even in areas without electricity. This will enable the students of the Learning Hub to be aligned with their western peers. The device, more or less as big as a brick, has been sold in 54 countries in the world including the US and Europe.

A hardwearing tablet that can be re-charged with solar energy

The technology developed by Brck Education (a young enterprise founded in 2013 in Nairobi, thanks to a crowd-funding that raised 172.00 US\$) enables to connect an entire class in a few minutes. The Kio Kit is sturdy, easy to use and reliable. The tablets are water and dust resistant and have an autonomy of 8 hours. The devices can be recharged in four hours from the mains (if available) or by solar panels. Each device is complete with headphones and has been designed es-

pecially for schools, even if it can be used in all sectors. Although there are numerous didactic contents (literature, mathematics, history) that have been developed for the Kenyan curriculum, it is also compatible with numerous android Apps available on the market and used by schools in the both Europe and the US.

Africa ready to make an incredible jump forward

According to the UN, there are currently 410 million students in Africa (destined to become 800 million in 2050). Only a very limited number of these students have access to Internet. When this hurdle will be exceeded this continent will have an incredible cultural and economical development. Thanks to generous sponsors, Make a Difference will be able to buy a complete kit with 40 tablets for 5.000 US\$.

It is with great pride and pleasure to witness that not only the children at BES but also their friends in Kenya will have the opportunity to receive and education which is a model of excellence.
