I would like to share but a few with you in our Winter Newsletter. One of our association's priorities is to help young people create meaning by helping others. Volunteering makes you happy, it increases self-confidence and instills a sense of purpose. We start teaching the importance of giving to our students from a very early age. What joy therefore that in August two of our ex students Sole and Olimpia Castelbarco, who are studying in grade four at Parini and 12th IB at Hockerill College, decided to help out at the Learning Hub. SOLE VISITS THE LEARNING HUB I WILL NEVER FORGET

My amazing experience has come to an end. My heart is filled with overwhelming feelings and memories. This has been one of the most beautiful and inspiring experiences I have ever had in my life. I was a bit apprehensive at first but the children welcomed me with their wonderful songs and one child said "welcome, welcome to our class".

The daily routine

Teacher Tabby explained to me the children's routine and



then showed me the other class-rooms and intro-duced me to the other children. By mid morning I started to work with a group of 7 children, aged from 5 to 7. They are wonderful children. They immediately

asked me to read them stories and teach something to them. And so I did. I was amazed by their eagerness to learn/study as opposed to most of my peers who find these activities boring.

So sweet, so polite

Soon after, I learned their names and started to be more familiar with them. Shirleen is a very nice and polite little girl.

Maxwell, the young boy with artificial legs, is always smiling and play-

ful. Ahmed is a very little boy always lost in thought. Slim Rooney with long eyelashes is a joker. Faith is a very sweet but lively little girl with lots of little plaits who was always biting her shoe. And, finally, my two favourites: Kefati, with the most incredible toothless smile in the world and Bahati Angel, the little girl I was most fond of because she was just like me: a bit shy but willing to open up with time, a very scrupolous and sweet child.

The world is so unjust

I reflected on how the world is unjust. So many opportunities for us, whereas these children deserve so much more. I feel however relieved as I think that the new school we are supporting is helping them to have access to a high level of education. On the last day of school we staged a kind of Sports Day. The children participated in a number of games and sang a number of songs about love.

Precious gifts for me

I was deeply moved by Bahati's way of looking at me. When for example they sang "I love you, you love me, we are a happy family", she looked at me in a way I'll never forget. I'll always treasure these memories and emotions. I will always keep the plastic ring that Maxwell made for me with his little fingers. I will keep these feelings, the memories of their smiles and thier wonderful acts of kindness in my heart.

Zawadi. Zawadi in Swahili means gift, a precious gift. Zawadi is the name of a wonderful little girl of eight, one of the students at The Learning Hub our school. The short, but very intense week which I spent at the school gave me the possibility of helping the teachers but above all through this experience I received so much. The genuine smiles of the children, the joy permeating from their eyes, the genteelness they radiated in thanking us made this an unforgetta-

ble experience. A little boy called Japheth said one day "the Learning Hub is my second home". Having given this small contribution has not only enriched me but has also made me aware of the reality these children live. These children are born without parents, a home or the certainty of being able to go to school. The Learning Hub offers them a family community and the assurance of an education. Our help is precious for them just as their disarming smiles are for us.



They are very eager pupils and seeing the spark of curiosity and pure excitement in their eyes reminded me that they are children, just like our children, and they too have

dreams and aspirations: to be nurses, doctors, teachers or veterinarians. These dreams are all possible for them now with the education that The Learning Hub provides. It is all a result of your kind donations, and I can be a testimony and say that you are really Making a Difference!



How lucky we are

I flew out of Milan on the evening of the 29th October with Marco, who is a film maker and came to document this amazing project. After a brief stop off at Rome, we flew direct to Mombasa, where a car was waiting for us to take us to Watamu, approximately two hours away. Immediately looking out the window as we drove through the city, it was a completely new world. The landscape is stunning and the huge baobab trees were beautiful. Debbie met us outside and she kindly welcomed us into her home for the week. I honestly feel like I lived a month compressed into a week. I met so many amazing children, helped them at school, provided training for The Learning Hub teachers, saw zebras, lions and elephants, learned to dance and sing Kenyan style and most importantly realised how lucky we really are. We are working on setting up iPads for the children to use to support their learning and are continuing to help the teachers provide the best learning experience possible for these (Angie, Reception 3 Teacher) children.
